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Itineraries



2 weeks Best of Israel

Spent your first four days in and around Jerusalem, including a couple of days wandering the alleys of the Old City, exploring the Western Wall and the adjacent Temple Mount. Al-Haram ash-Sharif, and following the Via Dolorosa to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. Break out your picnic and hiking shoes for a full-day excursion down to the Dead Sea and up the arid slopes of Mt. Mar Elias. Then head to the Mediterranean coast for three days around Tel Aviv, dividing your time between strolling, cycling, lazing on the beach, fine dining and watching the world go by. Next, head up the coast for a peek at Roman era Caesarea before pushing on to Haifa. Check out the views from atop Mt Carmel and the Bahá'í Gardens before a day trip to the western city of Akko (Acre) and the gardens of Bahá'í Wilhelms. After a day in Nazareth, accompanied with a long-riding horse driver, head to Tibériade for a day exploring the charred shores of the Sea of Galilee. On the drive back to Jerusalem, stop at the Roman ruins in Beit She'an.



4 weeks Israeli Odyssey

After four or five days in and around Jerusalem, including a couple of days exploring the Old City and a half-day visit to the Israel Museum, take a trip down to the western coast at Beit Givria, stopping at a winery on the way. Next, stir it up in Tel Aviv for a few days, strolling along the beachfront promenade to historic Jaffa, taking along the Yarkon River and working on your Mediterranean tan. On your way north to Haifa, stop at the Roman ruins of Caesarea and the quaint old town of Zikhron Ya'akov, famed for its vintage winery. After touring Bahá'í gardens Bahá'í Gardens, visit Mt Carmel and the Druze village of Daliyat al-Karmel. The next day, continue north to Akko (Acre), with its enchanting mixture of Crusader ruins and Ottoman ruins. Then go as far north as possible, to the wilderness gardens of Beit HaShimon, before heading inland for a couple of days in Nazareth, exploring Christian sites and dining on traditional Arab delicacies and East-West fusion dishes. Based in Tibériade for a couple of days, relax around the Sea of Galilee, combining ancient synagogues and Christian sites with quiet beaches and, perhaps, white-water rafting on the Jordan River. Long road to the Golan Heights, visiting the hilltop ruins of Gamla, the Golan Archaeological Museum in Katerin and towering Nimrod Fortunes. Circle west via the lush vegetation of Rasmata Nature Reserve to the outskirts of the Beitán Valley, infused by migrating herds, the quiet, cobble streets of Beit Pisan, and Tiberias, upland with the spirituality of the Kabbalah Jewish mysticism. Finally, head south through the Jezreel Valley, strolling the colonnaded Roman thoroughfares of Beit She'an and visiting the Palestinian city of Jericho, where ruins go back to the very beginning of civilization. After a starlit night on the shores of the Dead Sea, rise early to catch the sunrise from high atop Masada. Continue north into the Negev Desert for a day or two around Mt Sinai, including a hike into Mt Sinai. Next stop, for a spot of sea, sun and surfing, is Eilat. Finally, cross into Jordan to visit the awe-inspiring red city of Petra.

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
